February 1, 2017 marked the date that a big spotlight went out in our lives and we lost our beloved Bob Turk at the young age of 91. Even though he was bigger than life, he was a quiet man and heard that he laid down for a nap and peacefully went to sleep. At Bob's request, he did not want a funeral and it is unknown at the present time whether there will be a memorial service.

Bonnie Joe and I hired him to choreograph our show, "legends on ice" which we had in Long Beach, at Caesar's Palace Vegas for five weeks and the Tropicana for four weeks, he was talented a little crazy, and openminded funds or the guy sometimes hard to deal with but that's because he was so talented! Where Are They Now?

Ken Shook – Continental & West Companies – 1974 – 1978 (Mr. Backflip!)

Where are you from and where did you live?

I was born and raised in Southern California and moved to Visalia. Shortly after arriving my two sisters had enrolled in dance classes and I would attend their lessons to watch. Because I took an interest on my own, the instructors took me under their wings and began training me in dance as well as basic tumbling skills.

How did you achieve your lifelong dream of skating in an ice show?

At the age of 15 I saw my first Ice Capades performance which got me interested in wanting to learn how to skate. A temporary rink was opened and I began frequenting the public sessions and would join the others in racing around the ice in their counter clockwise circles around the rink. At about that same time the dance studio was about to close but I continued skating and soon landed my first job at the rink. Having seen in the Ice Capades program that you could audition at 17, I had my heart set on doing just that. My first audition was with Dolly Pierce and Bobby Specht. Thankfully former Capades skaters Myra and Richard Garrett had moved to town to begin a skating school at the rink where I worked. After working hard, and going to my second audition which was conducted by Dolly and Phil Romayne, I was told that my height (5'6") was an obstacle but to never give up, I began writing to Phil asking for any details on the opening of the third Ice Capades Company. Luckily it was going to happen and they were looking for an acrobat. With a lot of hard work, I was able to perform the backflip as well as well as the back consecutive handsprings and cartwheels. I was finally on my way.

Your Professional skating years -



The new Continental show opened in October of 1974 and after 4 years of first stepping on the ice as well as seeing my first ice show, I was finally realizing my dream of joining the Ice Capades. I played the part of Mark in Lidsville and also assisted Vic Zoble in his comedy trampoline number and did a few line numbers. I remained with Continental for three seasons and then did one season with West Company before joining Holiday on Ice for their South American tour. Years later I also was asked to go to South Africa to perform for Marge Chase in one of her seasonal shows.

What happened after you hung up your skates?

After leaving the show I relocated to Atlanta and it was shortly after that when I became involved in the Fitness Industry. After teaching aerobics at a few small studios I was offered a position as a group exercise director and partner in a start- up chain of clubs that grew to 25 clubs before selling out in June of 2000 after sixteen years. I was involved in many charity events and worked with celebrities such as Richard Simmons and also was the technical judge for the first Step Challenge in 1992 with celebrity guests Bart Conner and Nadia Comaneci.

A great opportunity arrived in 1996 when I was asked to be the Fitness Director at the first ever Olympic Village Health Club during the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta. After selling the business, I took a bit of a break and

became the care giver for my Mom. During that time I also served as the Patron Services Director as well as the ADA and Volunteer Coordinator at the Fox theatre which is a 4600 seat venue in downtown Atlanta.

What are you doing now?

After being in that position for 14 years I decided to move into my semi-retirement phase of life so quit there and did a bit of traveling before settling down once again and accepting a couple part time positions with the City of Roswell. I am now enjoying my time off taking daily walks with his four legged companion Cody, doing occasional retreats and am still called on from time to time to serve as House Manager for the local Cultural Arts Center as well as assisting as the Rental Coordinator for the local Adult Recreation Center.


What is your fondest memory?

Another Trip Down Memory Lane



Doug Martin published a book called 'Frozen Community 'that contained a collection of stories and memories while he was on tour with Ice Capades for 11 years. For those of you who were lucky enough to have gotten a copy, the stories that he collected from our alumni certainly brought great memories and recollections. Because the book is no longer available, thought I would share with everyone some of the stories, some of which are classic. Am certain that it will give you a giggle or two with some of the antics that went on. We can always use a laugh or two.

Our Freddie Trenkler was famous for pulling pranks. Dave Pitts recollects one that he pulled on Johnny LaBrecque.



It was in Cleveland, Ohio, one year that Freddie Trenkler, prankster that he was, pulled his famous water joke on Johnny LaBrecque. Since our dressing rooms were so old and had overhead water pipes that ran their full length, Freddie got an idea. He ran a long, thin tube – which was virtually invisible unless you knew what to look for – from beneath his makeup table, up the wall, and across the pipes, stopping directly over LaBrecque's seat at the long makeup table where we all sat side by side to put on our show makeup.

We had no idea what Freddie had done. All we knew was that a few minutes after Johnny sat down to start his makeup, water began to drip, drip dripping onto Johnny's head and shoulders from the pipes high above him. He looked confused for a few minutes as he tried to figure out where the water was coming from. He even tried to move his chair, but we were so crowded together that he couldn't get away from the drip, dripping of the water, which was landing on him alone.

Throwing a fit, Johnny demanded that because he'd been in the show longer than the rest of us, and therefore had seniority, he exchanged places with Freddie's assistant. I believe it was Doug Martin at the time. So after bantering a few words back and forth, good-natured Doug gave in and switched places. Naturally, the moment they switched, the water stopped dripping. Doug asked what Johnny was complaining about, because nothing was dripping on him. Johnny bitched and complained, but moved back to his spot in front of his costumes. A few minutes went by, and again the pipes above Johnny began to drip, dripping. Well, this time Johnny went ballistic and demanded that Doug switch places with him again. So good Ole Doug switched back, and, of course, the dripping immediately stopped.

Since Johnny and his partner, George Bussey, we're always the first comedy act that followed the opening number, they had to leave the dressing room and get backstage to warm up, and be ready to go on the ice. The moment they left, Freddie jumped up, grabbed a step ladder that he had stored away, climbed up and moved the tubing so that it would once again stop over Johnny's new seat at the makeup table. While this was going on, the rest of us sat there fascinated and then, warned by Freddie that we couldn't laugh or in any way blow his joke, anxiously awaited LaBrecque's return.

With their act over, Johnny, in his usual happy, blustery mood about how good his performance went, took off his costume, put on a robe, and sat down at his new spot at the makeup table to remove his comic's makeup and get ready for his next number. Almost immediately, the water began drip, drip, dripping. This time, Johnny went berserk, and the rest of us, Doug included, who were now privy to the joke, did everything we could to hide our faces and to keeping from laughing out loud.

When Johnny once again demanded that Doug switch places with him, Doug put up a little fight before giving in. Momentarily satisfied, Johnny left the room to cool down and have a cup of coffee. The moment he left, Freddie jumped up and re-switched the tubing, only this time George was also in on the gag.

Johnny returned in a much better mood, and sat down to begin putting on his makeup for second comedy spot. Almost immediately the water began to drip, drip, dripping. Johnny jumped up, screaming and carrying on, then stomped out of the dressing room in search of the manager, Jack Balmer, to complain about the rotten, no good dressing room with the drippy pipes.

The moment he left, Freddie climbed up and removed the tubing so that when Johnny returned with Jack there was no evidence. Jack took one look at our faces and knew we'd all been up to no good. Playing the role of manager, he simply said, "I see the bad pipes have stopped themselves. I don't expect them to start dripping again, necessitating another visit from me. Have a good show." But as he left, there was no mistaking the knowing smile on his face.

The rest of the show went off as planned, with no further incidents, but that night at the bar, Jack came up and quietly asked who did what, and how? When told, he got a big grin on his face, said, "I love it." And went to get another beer.
