John Bate - Oct. 23, 2023



John went gently into that good night on 26 October 2023, at home in Victoria, BC, aged 87 years. He was a loving son, husband, father, family man, friend and member of the BC sports community.

'Johnny Bates' grew up at 2788 Franklin Street in the East End of Vancouver, one block away from the Forum at the PNE. He attended Hastings, Templeton and Vancouver Technical schools. He completed a four-year apprenticeship at the Vancouver Vocational Institute and received his Journeyman Plumbing Certificate.

John was a talented athlete and top junior hockey prospect. Judged too short to play professionally, on a bet he tried out and became the first hockey player to make

the **Ice Capades**, a feat written up in *Sports Illustrated*. Between 1958 and 1962, John travelled the world entertaining people on ice, including a memorable visit to Russia during the Cold War. John was an accomplished showman (a trait he carried throughout his life) and thrilled audiences as a clown, character and cast member in many skits and shows. During his time at Ice Capades, he fell in love with Marilyn Braun, a fellow skater from the Prairies and Victoria, and the two of them began married life in Vancouver with John as Building Supervisor for the PNE Agrodome.

John and Marilyn settled in Victoria in 1965 when he became Assistant Manager of Memorial Arena. He was promoted to Deputy Director of Recreation in 1970 and retired as Director of Parks and Recreation in 1997. During that time, John was variously responsible for Memorial Arena, Crystal Pool, Royal Athletic Park, Royal Theatre and McPherson Playhouse.

John had a love affair with the Victoria sports community and a passion for the 'Barn on Blanshard'. In addition to his job, he and Marilyn volunteered as organizers at hundreds of international, national and local sports competitions over five decades, including the Commonwealth Games. He was a lifelong member and Past President of the Recreation Facilities Association of BC. He was a founding member and Past President of the Greater Victoria Sports Hall of Fame and honoured when he and Marilyn were inducted in 2016.

John had a soft spot for Christmas. For over 30 years, he and Marilyn and their neighbours hosted 'Candy Cane Lane' on Tattersall Drive which brought holiday cheer to thousands of visitors each year who came to see the displays, meet Santa Claus and his elves and receive free candy canes. It was John's way of sharing the season of joy that he never experienced as a child.

Eileen Geho-Sussman - Oct. 28, 2023



Eileen Geho Sussman, an Allentown native and longtime resident of South and Central Florida, died peacefully October 28 in her home in Melbourne, Fla. following a long battle with cancer. She was 79.

Sussman, born March 8, 1944, was the only child of Helen (Bennett) and Elwood Richard. She is survived by her husband of 35 years, Bernard Sussman, daughters Tracy (Reiff) Jacobs (Indian Harbour Beach, Fla.), Robin (Reiff) Nuno (Macungie, Pa.), grandchildren Michael, Valerianne, Matthew and Elizabeth, and step children Karin and Shawn. Sussman was married to Allentown baseball standout Mel Geho, who died of cancer in 1982.

Sussman was a 1962 graduate of Louis E. Dieruff High School in Allentown where she served as senior class secretary and was head cheerleader. After graduation, Sussman joined the cast of the **Ice Capades**. She also was crowned Queen of the Allentown St. Patrick's Day Parade. She passed her skills as a professional skater on to a new generation, teaching skating classes for area children.

Sussman worked as a bookkeeper for Brookhaven Homes and as a travel agent for many years, helping clients visit destinations around the world.

"My mother was a person of great kindness and love," said Tracy Jacobs, Sussman's oldest daughter. "She lived a long and inspiring life and passed away peacefully surrounded by those who cherished her. She will be greatly missed by her family and many friends, but she leaves us all with wonderful memories -- the kind of loyalty, humor, passion for life, and kindness we should all aspire to."

"My mother was my best friend, my rock and my biggest supporter," said Robin Nuno. "Her loss is immeasurable and will be felt by her family and friends for many years to come.

Oleg Protopopov – Oct. 31, 2023



Oleg Protopopov, a double Olympic champion in the realm of pairs figure skating, has died at 91. Together with his partner Ludmila Belousova, Protopopov clinched gold at the Olympic Games in Innsbruck (1964) and Grenoble (1968), and four times emerged as the champions of the world and Europe (1965-1968).

Revolutionizing Figure Skating

Competing with his spouse Ludmila Belousova, Protopopov was a pioneer in pairs skating, introducing many elements that are now mandatory in competitions. Their contributions have significantly revolutionized pairs figure skating with their innovative elements and performances. Their legacy extends beyond the Olympic Games with multiple victories in world and European championships.

A Legacy Remembered

The Skating Lesson, a trusted figure skating community source, announced Protopopov's death, highlighting his enduring impact on the sport. Protopopov's wife and skating partner, Ludmila Belousova, passed away in 2017. Protopopov's career and legacy extend beyond his Olympic success. He and Belousova were trailblazers, introducing new elements and pushing the boundaries of pairs figure skating.

Inspiring Future Generations

Protopopov's achievements were globally acknowledged and celebrated. They were inducted into the Figure Skating Hall of Fame in Colorado Springs, USA. Their innovative elements and performances will continue to inspire current and future generations of figure skaters. In 1979, while on tour in Switzerland, Protopopov and Belousova sought political asylum and did not return to the Soviet Union. They spent the rest of their lives in Switzerland.

The passing of Oleg Protopopov marks the end of an era in figure skating. His contributions will forever be remembered, and he leaves behind a legacy of innovation and excellence that has left an indelible mark on figure skating. The figure skating community and fans worldwide mourn the loss of a true legend and pay tribute to Protopopov's remarkable career.



RELIVING FOND MEMORIES



Doug Martin had published two books called 'Frozen Community' where he wanted to have skaters tell funny stories about their time on the road. Stories were posted before but worth sharing again. Here is a story from **Lori Elliott** sharing a secret about Ken Shook's interesting sideline – Read on----

Ken Shook was the show's skating acrobat. Being that he could do backflips and walk all over on his hands and such, he would do this off

ice as well. He was hanging out with us one day, and we were all bored, staying in some old multi-story hotel in a city I don't recall. Ken decided to break the boredom, so we went out on the window ledge, some six or seven stories up, and walked along the ledge of the hotel, upside down on his hands, just to get the reaction of the people down below on the ground. Wow.

When our show toured Japan, we had to take a long ferry ride to Atami. It was really foggy, and we found a bird that had crashed into the ship. It was dead, of course, and wouldn't you know, one of Ken's hobbies was taxidermy! So we all decided that he should stuff this poor, dead bird. From the ship's galley, we gathered up some flour and water for a paste — not your traditional taxidermy supplies — and we watched as Ken stuffed that bird. At the reunion, I asked Ken if he still had the bird, and to my amazement, he said that he'd kept it all these years, and had only parted with the poor thing the year before.

Ken added – He didn't have the right kind of preservatives while in Japan, and had to make do with what I had. After many moves and many years of neglect, the poor guy was looking a little tattered, so I knew it was time to give him up. At least I have a picture. But the funniest part was that the press did a story about me smuggling him back home in my skating boot. I was always nervous that the authorities would knock on my door someday. To be honest, I think I'd have gotten rid of him too. Especially since someone, somewhere, might say something at the wrong time and the Bird Police would show up to claim the prize!!

Learning that Ken was an amateur taxidermist surprised a lot of people. No doubt there were a lot of performers on tour with the show who were talented in many different areas. I'm sure there were singers, musicians, dancers, actors and those who were athletic in a variety of sports other than skating. Unfortunately, not a lot of people were aware of these talents until somebody was leaving the show to pursue other fields of work, many times in the entertainment business.

He finished in


